Praying to the Father, through the Son, by the Holy Spirit

We see how the whole Trinity works together in Jesus' baptism: The Spirit comes upon him in the form of a dove, the Father speaks from heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased."

In our prayer life we see all members of the Trinity work together. God is love! And for God to be love, love must have an object. The eternal Father, Son and Holy Spirit live in this perfect, glorious unity of love.

We come to the Father who loves us. We come to the Son who makes our case, is our advocate. He is sitting at the Father's right hand making intercession for us:

Because Jesus lives forever, he has a permanent priesthood. 25 Therefore he is able to save completely those who come to God through him, because he always lives to intercede for them. (Hebrews 7:24–25)

And the Spirit is at work in our hearts making this love of God real and present for us and enabling us to pray even when we are lost for words:

In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for God's people in accordance with the will of God. (Romans 8:26–27)

So we have Jesus, sitting by the Father's right hand for us and we have the Spirit at our right hand with us. They are working together, totally for us, involved in our praying, so we are able to pray to the Father, through the Son, by the Holy Spirit.

On this Trinity Sunday as we explore the healthy habit of prayer, may we be inspired to pray!

Opening Prayer (from Psalm 25)

As some of us are gradually coming out of lockdown, all of us will experience grief or anxiety or confusion or anger in various degrees. Let's make space to reflect on what has happened, to talk with others and to bring these emotions to God in prayer.

In you, LORD my God, I put my trust. I trust in you; do not let me be put to shame, nor let my enemies triumph over me.

Turn to me and be gracious to me, for I am lonely and afflicted. Relieve the troubles of my heart and free me from my anguish. Look on my affliction and my distress and take away all my sins.

Confession and Absolution

"Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us." We confess any grudges we hold, or bitter roots we have cultivated.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour in thought and word and deed, through negligence, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We are truly sorry, and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name. Amen.

May God who loved the world so much that he sent his Son to be our Saviour forgive us our sins and make us holy to serve him in the world, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Today we begin to explore ten healthy habits of the Christian life, which are all based on the life of the early church in Acts 2 (underlined):

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and generous hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

Reading: Matthew 6. 7-13

'When you are praying, do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard because of their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him.

'Pray then in this way:

Our Father in heaven,

hallowed be your name.

Your kingdom come.

Your will be done,

on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our debts,

as we also have forgiven our debtors.

And do not bring us to the time of trial, but rescue us from the evil one.

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.
