A Whole New World Out There by Christoph Lindner

When I was a student in the late 80s I had my first taste of the internet. Working as a student assistant in the linguistics department of Freiburg University, I had to exchange data with a US university *online* by typing cryptic commands into a computer terminal. I couldn't have dreamed how much this embryonic internet was going to transform most spheres of life.

This change has of course been accelerated by the Coronavirus crisis - it's hard to imagine how we would have coped without online shopping, working, school lessons, online entertainment and ... church services!

Any new invention has the potential to be a blessing or a curse depending on how we use it and the internet is no different. The World Wide Web has been a gift for many - fostering *relationships*, providing *resources* and giving voice to people suffering from *repression*. But over the last few years we have increasingly learned about the dangers of online fraud, crime and exploitation, binge watching, game and social media addiction, the psychological burden which social media places on many (especially young) people, and the illusion that our hankering for money, sex and power can be satisfied.

It is instructive that many Silicon Valley bosses keep their own children away from the internet as long as possible. Eric Schmidt, who was chairman of Google for many years, has written that there is now a tale of two civilisations: "One is physical and has developed over thousands of years, and the other is virtual and is still very much in formation."

So, what should we think of it and how should we use the internet as Christians?

The Apostle Paul reminds his readers to think about things that are *pure, beautiful, commendable, excellent* and then to live that way (*Philippians 4.8-9*). How does my use of the internet stack up against that standard? Where do I see a need for a reset?

At times it will be right to retreat from the internet for a time, to even establish a rhythm of fasting from screen time. But as followers of Jesus we are called to be good news people in all spheres of life. "You will be my witnesses to the ends of the world" says Jesus to his disciples before he leaves them. The ends of the world include the World Wide Web.

We are the first generation of Christians inhabiting that virtual world. How do we represent Christ in that world?
