SUMMARY OF THE LAW

GOSPEL READING: Matt 11. 2-11

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

All: Glory to you, O Lord

When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?' Jesus answered them. 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offence at me.'

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in roval palaces. What then did you go out

to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you. and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before vou."

Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he..

SFRMON

THE CREED

We believe in one God. the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord. When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory. Jesus Christ is Lord:

Lord, by your cross and resurrection you have set us free. You are the Saviour of the world.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.
Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven.



The Evangelical Alliance, along with others, was part of a piece of research called Talking Jesus.

Despite our increasingly secular culture, 27.5 million people ticked the Christian box. We also discovered that 45% of the population were willing to tick the box to say they believe in the resurrection. Also, 54% believe that Jesus was a real human being. Note how closely this ties in with the latest census figures for those who identify as Christians. The majority of those who ticked the Christian box in the census may not attend church regularly, but there is likely an openness to Jesus and the history defining moment of the resurrection.

It is also interesting to note the rise of the 'nones' in the census. The census tells us that the Christian population has dropped by 13.1%, which is a lot. But most aren't off to follow a new religion. The biggest rise, up 12%, was in those who ticked 'no religion'. The census only found 32,000 agnostics, 14,000 atheists and 10,000 humanists. Most Christian denominations are bigger than these groups, despite the generous media coverage they receive.

So the census figures may show that nominalism is dying. But that group, representing almost half the population, likely believe in Jesus and the resurrection. Even the 22.2 million who ticked 'no religion' haven't opted for another religion. Some aren't convinced by the sanitised version of Christianity they have been offered, but they also aren't convinced by anything else.

"I think this is a watershed moment for us as a Church though it's been coming for many years. How we respond should affect the life of every local church, every diocese, and every part of the life of the Church of England. My prescription is in essence very, very simple. It is that, following Andrew, we place telling other people about Jesus at the heart of our common life and at the head of our priorities." Bishop Steven Croft

"Ironically, I think the secular imagination has far more challenges in store. For once it has finished piggybacking on the inherited deposit of faith, it will have to work out what it believes and why. Without a meaningful moral story to underpin it, might will be right and power supreme." Rev'd Giles Fraser

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A Warm Space at

St Mark's Church Hall?

At our PCC meeting on Tuesday 6 December we discussed the possibility of creating a warm space at St Mark's. Here is the concept:

Target group:

- older people
- those who live on their own
- parents and children after school

Format:

- Weekly on Wednesdays from 12pm to 5pm during cold season
- A welcoming, warm space (lighting, comfortable seating in small room)
- Simple soup and bread roll meal available
- Book swap shelf with donated books
- Option of running "Parent Talk" sessions before school pickup
- Leaflet drop to houses in walking distance of St Mark's
- Time-limited project: Commit to at least four to six weeks and then review response
- Start around middle/end of January

This proposal is very much dependent on forming a team that will be able to sustain a warm space once a week during the winter months. Is this something you would like to support? Could you commit to helping once a month for at least 2 hours?
