WONDERFUL TREES MESSAGE FROM CHRISTOPH LINDNER, RECTOR

Dearfriends.

I have always loved trees. As a little boy I found a maple sapling under the brambles in our garden and replanted it next to the sandpit. It very soon outgrew me. Imagine how excited I was when I returned years later and saw how this tree now towered over the surrounding buildings!

At Forest Church we have learnt so much about trees, how they provide shade and shelter, a perch for birds, roots for burrowing animals. They host mosses and climbers and are a home to countless insects. Trees are a source of food and materials. We never know quite who is going to be blessed by a tree, especially one that lives for hundreds of years and well beyond the lifetime of the planter. Some Bristlecone trees in Eastern California have been dated as being nearly 5,000 years old!

It has been said that trees are a silent witness to history. I've learnt from Martin Davies (vicar in Harefield) that great forests covered what is now the UK 360 million years ago. Trees have witnessed pre-human climate change as well as that which is now being driven by ourselves.



Trees are mentioned in the Bible more than any living thing other than people. In the Bible's account of creation, God puts trees in the garden of Eden. The Middle East, where these accounts were written, is a dry region, where trees are a sign of water, fertility and blessing. The Bible often uses trees to illustrate peace and provision, describing how in times of peace people sit in the shade of their own trees.

Jesus compared his kingdom to a growing tree in which birds find a home. The end of the Bible describes God's coming perfect kingdom like a tree of life that always bears fruit and whose leaves are for the healing of the nations. How fitting that one of the central symbols of Christmas is a tree!

As I write this, I am yearning and praying for this God-given peace and

healing - in people's lives, among families, neighbours, communities and nations. I sense a tension when we celebrate Jesus, the Prince of Peace at Christmas, when we hear the angels' song to shepherds, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests." (Luke 2:14). Because this peace is lacking in so many places.

But with Jesus a new age has begun, so radically different that we still count our years from his birth. This birth didn't happen in a vacuum, out of the blue, but was part of God's plan to bring peace and blessing. There is a lovely tradition of the church, retelling this greatest of all stories in the form of a "Jesse Tree": It represents Jesus' family tree (which includes Jesse, the father of King David). As families decorate their Jesse Tree during Advent, they see how God prepared for Jesus to be born for many generations.

As we wait for Christmas and retell the story of Jesus, we learn that we are part of his ongoing story, that he invites us to bring peace and healing in our generation. And when things seem hopeless, God hasn't given up yet! Jesus died on a tree, made into a cross (page 6), and his friends thought

it was all over. But on the third day, he came back to life to give us hope even in hopeless situations. The light of Christmas can never be extinguished, because Jesus, the Light of the World, is alive today!

There are many ways to tell God's story of hope this Christmas: Complete the prayer angel on the back cover and put it on your Christmas tree or bring it to St Mary's as a decoration for our big tree in church. Buy a special Advent calendar that retells the story (page 21), go for a bracing winter walk and spot signs of new life in the depths of winter, come to our Carol and Christmas services to sing about Jesus, the King in the manger (pages 18-19). Pray that you would know the peace of Jesus, which passes all our human understanding.

Edda and I are wishing you a happy, peaceful and hopeful Christmas and new year!



MEMORIES OF A DENHAM GIRL BY ROSEMARY DORAN PART 3: SCHOOLING

My earliest memory of schooling was standing outside the Old Police Station at the top of Old Mill Road. This was the infants' school and fortunately it was not very long before I was sent to Denham Village Hall under the care of Mr Higgs who made early approaches to education very bearable and fun.

In those days – the late 1940s – there were no facilities for lunchtime catering at the Village Hall and we had to walk up Cheapside Lane to what was then the Junior and Senior Schools. The Canteen was one long room similar to a prefabricated Nissen Hut. Inside the tables were set out across the room with an aisle down the middle – boys on one side, girls on the other. Each of the infants' tables had a senior school pupil whose job it was to look after us.

In time I moved to the Junior School and then Senior School in Cheapside Lane. A good solid building, the inside of which was T-shaped. At the centre of the 'T' was a clock which faced along the length of the corridor. We soon found out that this was an area of punishment. If you misbehaved you had to stand under the clock for all to see. The minutes ticked by as you listened to your fellow students make disparaging comments as they passed. It was a good punishment and made

you behave.
Somehow though
I never could behave in
Mrs Dickenson's music class, too
much inclined to the giggles!

At last came the great news that the promised new school to accommodate seniors was ready and we would be attending school in Old Mill Road. This was a Secondary Modern named Alderbourne, with a School Hall, Library, Woodwork Room, Domestic Science Room and large comfortable classrooms. The Hall could be used for gymnastics and we even had changing rooms with showers.

My favourite 'O' level subjects were Art and French. We had an excellent art teacher from Durham, a Miss Roberts, who taught us well and helped us on our way to being budding artists. Lessons took place in the afternoon, and on one evening each week. We were even allowed to go round Denham on a Saturday, painting our lovely Village. I still paint for pleasure, but over the years I have had commissions and occasionally sold paintings direct from my easel.

Our Music Teacher, Mrs Entwhistle, taught us how to appreciate fine classical music and, as a choir, we often sang a selection of the old favourites such as 'Summer is a Coming in' and 'All in an April Evening'. My best experience of music was going into the Music Room one day whilst Bizet's L'Arlésienne was playing. I was transfixed and have loved Classical music ever since.

French being my other favourite subject, was rather unloved by my fellow students. I was the only entry for the examinations so had one to one lessons, often walking around the playground with my Teacher, conversing in French.

With all this going on I was appointed a Prefect and after a year I was appointed Head Girl which made me feel my schooling had been very worthwhile. Our Headmaster, Mr Entwhistle, set his standards for life and behaviour at Alderbourne and as for learning English grammar, woe betide you if you were inept at this subject. He also instructed us to play hockey on the Recreation Ground, which always seemed to be the coldest place in Denham - no warm clothes, just thin blouses and short shorts! It certainly made you chase the ball around to keep warm!

It became time to leave this idyllic life and I decided on a two-year course in science at High Wycombe College which was being run to increase one's GCSE 'O' and 'A' levels.

My daily commute was on a *steam train*, from Denham Golf Club Station. In due course, diesel trains replaced

the steam trains which were not nearly so much fun. However, my father was very pleased with this development, as, by this time we had moved to Higher Denham and our garden backed onto the railway line with the embankment frequently being engulfed in flame from fires set off by the steam trains!

After High Wycombe College I worked for British Aluminium in metallurgy for two years followed by a stint at Glaxo Laboratories, firstly in the Virus Department working on Polio Vaccines and then I moved to their Plant Pathology Department. In 1966 Robin and I got married in St Mary's Church and we continued living in Denham until 1968, when we moved to Egham in Surrey. I applied for a job in the Zoology Department of the Royal Holloway College where I worked for 28 years in Parasitology (the study of parasites) until I had to retire due to ill health.



MARTIN-BAKER AIRCRAFT COMPANY ITD BY BRIAN O'REGAN

Tuesday 10th October 2023 10.20 Nimes-Garons Airport, the South of France:

A pilot under training took off with his instructor in an Aermacchi MB-339C fighter jet. A problem occurred during take-off leading the instructor to pull the handle on the twin Martin-Baker Mk IT10LK eiection seats and the pilots were propelled clear of the aircraft which crashed at the end of the runway. Just two seconds after pulling the ejection seat handle, their parachutes were automatically deployed and they returned safely to earth. The Mk10 seat is fitted to over 5.500 aircraft and has saved over 800 lives.

non-test eiection took Pre-Mk1 Ejection Seat place on 30th May 1949 by Jo Lancaster. Jo was flying an Armstrong Whitworth AW52 aircraft and was forced to eject in a pre-Mk1 ejection seat (see picture) over Southam, Warwickshire. The time to

parachute deployment in this seat was a lengthy 20-30 seconds. The Martin-Baker (M-B) seat added seventy years to his life, for Jo died six months after his 100th birthday in 2019.

An M-B ejection seat is only activated once - it has to work! Rockets firing for less than a second propel the seat and pilot clear of the aircraft. After an ejection, nothing of the seat is reusable or even recoverable. By design and exceptional engineering, the occupant is recoverable and returns to flying. More lives saved by Martin-Baker that's 7,704 and counting. The aircraft may explode in a fireball but there is a proud glow over the Martin-Baker Aircraft Company factory in Denham. The 1050 employees at the Denham works and a further 160 at Chalgrove Airfield and Langford Lodge Northern Ireland, have all contributed to saving that life. The latest Mk18 seat costs up to £300,000, but the cost of training an RAF fast jet pilot is nearly £6m. However, the aircrews' lives and their families matter most to the company.

It's part of what drives this incredible company, or should it be family!

Sir James Martin was born in Killinchy Woods, Crossgar, Northern Ireland in September 1893. He found he had a talent for fixing vehicles and equipment on the farm and would make innovations to improve their operation. He emigrated to England and in 1929 founded Martin's Aircraft Works on the

present site at Denham to design and build a small aircraft the MB 1. Sir James formed a strong friendship with Captain Valentine Baker who had founded a flying school based at Heston

Aerodrome. Valentine's notable pupils included Edward Prince of Wales, soon to be King Edward VIII and Amy Johnson – the first woman to fly solo from England to Australia.

Valentine left Heston in 1934 to join Sir James in founding Martin-Baker Aircraft Company Ltd. Valentine was the test pilot as together they continued developing an aircraft for military use. Tragically, in September 1942 during the early days of testing the MB 3 fighter, the engine failed soon after take off and the aircraft crash landed, killing Valentine.

Devastated by the loss of his friend, Sir James set his innovative mind to work on aircrew safety. In 1944 he was invited to the Ministry of Aircraft Production to investigate providing fighter aircraft with a means of assisted escape. A year later his first seat was tested live by employee Bernard Lynch from a test tower. Seat development continued and it

was Bernard who made the first midflight test ejection on 24th July 1946.

Sir James died in 1981, but his company is in the safe hands of his twin sons, James and John, joint managing directors. As you read this, they will be celebrating their 81st birthday, but worry not, their sons are also in the management team. Incidentally, the Northern Bank (of Northern Ireland), as part of its Inventors Series, issued a £100 note in 2005 featuring Sir James.

I was very excited to visit the company on their 22-acre site in Lower Road recently, where my guide was Tony Gaunt, Business Development Executive. I'm grateful to Tony for his generosity of time and knowledge to gather material for this piece. Tony was a weapons technician with the RAF and served with the Harrier squadron in the Falklands war of 1982. He has been with the company for 22 years.

One may imagine factories being only automated production lines, but at M-B there is so much individual attention to quality and component testing, that the human factor is still

very much to the fore. I am sure this is key to employee satisfaction and cheer that was very evident on my walk-through. The company though, has embraced new technologies and has made considerable investment in state-of-the-art machines. They have, for example, a bank of four large CNC (Computer Numerical Control) milling machines which produce components from solid blocks of aluminium alloys.

With thousands of different components and numerous seat variations, batch sizes are often 5 to 15 parts. Short production runs require extremely quick machine change over time for different parts. These costly machines earn their keep as they operate 24/7, with skilled operatives scheduling long-running safe parts for the unmanned night shifts.

I spoke with Fitter Inspector Ernie Barter from Amersham, who joined the company in 1992. He says M-B are a great company to work for with a wonderful product. He takes pride in playing his part and gets a real buzz when "ejectees" are taken around the factory and thank him. Ernie said "I'm just doing my job and if you don't like what you do, you're not in the right job". Ernie may feel he has a small part in this success story but it is an essential part and he adds to the genial good atmosphere that permeates right through the workforce.

Innovation, quality and a great workforce have served this still family-owned business well. Turnover has grown from £31m in 1981 to £330m last year. Martin-Baker has a world leading position in the ejection seat

market with a 55% market-share. As you may expect, sales to North America dominate, and account for 43% of the company's business.

With such a mission-critical product, there is a rigorous testing programme at the design and prototype stage. Before in-flight testing, prototype seats are tested on a 6,200 ft rocket-sled test track at Langford Lodge, formerly RAF Langford. Located on the banks of Lough Neagh and just 35 miles from Sir James' birthplace, this state-of-the-art facility allows a range of speed tests using highly sensitive, high-tech test mannequins. All of the cockpits that are fired down the test sled are handmade by Martin-Baker employees.

The company has a manufacturing and testing facility at Chalgrove Airfield, Oxfordshire where seats are ejected from two refurbished Gloster Meteor aircraft. It is here that the pyrotechnics that go into a Martin-Baker ejection seat are manufactured. They don't have to seek volunteers like Bernard Lynch from the workforce, as today they use mannequins for all tests.

When you see an RAF jet passing above, take a moment to reflect that the pilot is sitting in an ejection seat made less than 1½ miles from our church. Behind the church you will find the resting place of Sir James Martin (died 1981), a life of service, a job so very well done, an enduring legacy.

"Come for Christmas?"

How to survive the festive season after a bereavement.

The Christmas lights are up, turkey bought, presents wrapped and the last thing you want is to be there!

"After losing my wife Christmas has never been the same but I don't want to let the family down. What can I do?" The words of my dear friend echo the feelings of many after the death of someone who is loved. Special events, perhaps a birthday, anniversary or indeed Christmas can cause us to struggle to cope with renewed intense feelings of sadness, anger or even guilt and self-blame. The "If onlys" that are so often part of grieving can leap into action at a Christmas song in Tesco's or festive advert on TV that reminds us of times past, and that now our special person will not be there to share it with us.

So how about making a survival plan? Grieving has its own pathway, but we can feel a positivity about exerting some control and identifying in advance ways that will help us negotiate what can feel like an unpredictable and formidable landscape.

To begin, be kind to yourself. It really is OK to step away from the usual traditions and rituals if that is what you want to do. If you are worried about hurting the feelings of others if you don't say "Yes" and choose to go then, if you can, schedule in some quiet

time beforehand to prepare yourself, and build into the event a "time out" strategy. Maybe setting aside a few minutes for yourself with a cup of tea during the festivities, explaining that you might have to leave early or taking the dog out for a walk after Christmas lunch for some "me" time.

For some people setting aside a particular time for remembering can help. One family I know has a particular time after Christmas lunch when a candle is lit, and memories shared. Another visits the grave of their loved one with close family, sit quietly and share in a McDonalds breakfast!

However you spend your time this Christmas season try to remember that it is OK not to be OK. Grasp the seasonal grief nettle and don't forget to allow yourself to laugh and have fun too, it doesn't mean that you have forgotten them!

NEW DEFIBRILLATOR IN DENHAM GREEN AND FREE EMERGENCY FIRST AID TRAINING



Denham Parish Church are delighted to report that there is a new Automated Emergency Defibrillator (AED) on the outside wall of St Mark's House, Green Tiles Lane, Denham Green which is next to St Mark's Hall. The defibrillator, along with training, has been purchased as a joint venture with the charity AEDdonate, The Community Board of Denham, Gerrards Cross and the Chalfonts (Buckinghamshire Council) and Denham Parish Church.

The AED will serve as a vital device for the local community and allow a rapid response to anyone nearby who has a sudden cardiac arrest. The device is also registered with our local Ambulance Trust for use in an emergency.

Free training on how to use the AED defibrillator and also in CPR and other emergency first aid will be held at St Mark's Hall, Tile House Lane, Denham Green UB9 5HT.

- Would you know how to recognise if someone's heart has stopped?
- Do you want to learn CPR and how to use a defibrillator to help them?
- Learn how to deal with someone choking, adults, children and babies
- How to recognise strokes using FAST test
- How do you support a person having a diabetic emergency?
- Supporting an unconscious person.

How to protect yourself from fraud and scams

PHONE SCAMS

A cold call is a phone call out of the blue from a company or person you've never dealt with before, usually trying to sell you something. They aren't always scams, but they can be irritating.

Say no!

Report any scams: Forward unwanted texts to 7726 for free so your mobile phone provider can flag potential scams.

Check the line: Be aware that scammers can keep your phone line open even after you've hung up. Use a different phone, call someone you know first to check the line is free, or wait at least 10 to 15 minutes between calls to make sure that any scammers have hung up.

Cut the cold calls: Join the free Telephone Preference Service (TPS). This should cut the number of cold calls you receive, though it won't necessarily block all scammers. TPS has a service to stop cold calls to mobile phones too. Go to their website or text 'TPS' and your email address to 85095 to register.

Call the company: If you get a phone call from an organisation asking you for personal information, contact the company directly using a known email or phone number to check the call is legitimate.

DOOR STEP SCAMS

Stop: Are you expecting anyone?

Lock: If not, lock any other outer doors before answering the front door, as some scammers work together.

Chain: Put the door chain on – but remember to take it off again if people with a key, such as a carer or cleaner, need to be able to get in. Look through the peep hole to see who's there.

Check: Ask for an identity card and examine it carefully. If you're still unsure, shut the door and phone the company the person says they're from. Get the number from a bill or your phone book. Don't worry about leaving someone waiting, if they're who they say they are, they won't mind. If you're being pressured or feel unsafe, contact friends, family or the police.

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


